

# Weekly Legislative Update: Climate Crisis and Energy

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### January 28, 2024,

## **Bills Needing Action this Week**

HB 1012 Creating an Extreme Weather Response Grant Program. The legislature recognizes the increasing risks and threats to socially vulnerable people (including pets) from extreme weather events such as heat, cold, smoke, and flooding. This bill will provide funding for communities with a demonstrated lack of resources, to meet the costs of responding to community needs during such periods. This is for cities, counties, towns, and tribes that have emergency management organizations.

HB 2129/SB 6039 Geothermal energy resources requires a geological survey to facilitate identifying geologic features of both sources of geothermal energy and potential hazards such as inducing seismicity (earthquakes). Geothermal heat can drive clean base-load electricity generation with energy extracted from high-temperature rock and water sourced thousands of feet below the surface. Washington state already leases state-owned land for geothermal energy, and this bill will require an update to the lease rates for development of geothermal resources. Depending on appropriations available, grants may be offered to private entities to share direct costs of exploration activities in high potential areas. HB 2129 is scheduled for a hearing in the House Committee on Environment & Energy on Monday, January 29.

# In Other Advocacy

Last Thursday, we testified for HJM 4003 Requesting that the United States join in developing a Fossil Fuel Nonproliferation Treaty. A summary of our remarks follow.

The 2200 members of the League in Washington State have an intense interest in minimizing the progress of climate change and in doing our part. The League of Women Voters studies the issues carefully and defines our positions by member consensus. The League was founded over 100 years ago to ensure voters are knowledgeable on policy issues.

Through that study, the League believes that an international approach to combating climate change ... is necessary to protect public health and defend the overall integrity of the global ecosystem—and governments must continue to address this issue, while considering the ramifications of their decisions, at all levels — local, state, regional, national, and global.<sup>1</sup>

WA is working hard to do its part—as we can, and as we should, and as should all states. The Federal Government should use its significant influence and leadership to coordinate action across regions and nations so all our efforts will be as consistent and effective as they can be.

The League of Women Voters of WA is on record as supporting and advocating for the relevant and related legislation listed in this Memorial. As this committee did with those bills, please schedule a vote and pass this memorial. Thank you for arranging for WA citizens and organizations to participate in our democracy.
