

Weekly Legislative Update: Local News and Democracy

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Bill Updates

No new action this week.

SB 5626 Expanding and Enhancing Media Literacy and Digital Citizenship in K-12: Has been moved to the X Files. As previously noted, Sen. Marko Liias has turned to the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction for an administrative approach to expanding media literacy and digital citizenship education. With revised Learning Standards now addressing media literacy and digital citizenship education more fully, OSPI officials will begin in March to convene inperson focus groups and create networking opportunities through the state's Educational Service Districts to review the updated standards. Public comment periods will begin in August, followed by professional development training beginning in January 2025.

An OPSI official said teachers will be expected to begin teaching under the new standards in mid-2026.

SB 5102 Concerning School Library and Technology Programs: Sen. Wellman's bill, which would have required each district to adopt a policy requiring a teacher-librarian to provide media literacy and digital citizenship education, failed to advance by the Feb. 13 cut-off and so it will not proceed this year. A new version may be introduced next year.
